I feel I have not only seen change in the last 14 years but have been part of bringing some of these changes for the betterment of the LGBT community and PFLAG.



The Gladstone Police Citizens Youth Welfare Association (PCYC) in Queensland will hold an awareness day for lesbian, gay, bi-sexual and transgender (LGBT) groups after receiving a \$4525 FRRR ABC Heywire Youth Innovation Grant.

For the first time ever, Heywire partnered with the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal to give communities around Australia the opportunity to implement Heywire ideas with up to \$70 000 in seed funding.

The Gladstone PCYC will hold 'Breaking Down the Door Day', an idea devised at the 2013 Heywire Summit that aims to create and build acceptance for LGBT groups.

PCYC Gladstone Youth Worker, Anna Witty, says after attending National Youth Week 2013, it was clear that there was no support for young LGBT people in Gladstone.

"I began a LGBT support group at PCYC but we're having difficulty connecting our community and getting people aware that it is available for them.

The grant and community awareness day should hopefully raise awareness of the support group that is available in the community."

Witty says the PCYC 'Breaking Down the Door Day' event will replicate the original idea developed by the Heywire Summit participants, with entertainment such as an indoor roller derby and a film discussing the grey areas of sexuality.

"We haven't massively changed it, we really liked the original suggestion of the farmer's market, we want to keep it free as that attracts a lot of people, lots of food and activities for younger children as that attracts families."

Witty says the activities should re-inforce the fact that despite sexual diversity, everyone should be treated the same.

"One of the ideas that we have come up with is a stall where people can design some kind of mask, everybody looks different but we are all the same underneath, it doesn't matter what your sexuality is, we're all the same and I don't understand why being LGBT should mean that you look a person differently, I mean you're still the same person you went to Maccas with last week."

Witty hopes the event will unite the community and even encourage other young people to join the PCYC LGBT support group.

"We would really like to bring the community together and publicly show their acceptance of all, if at the same time we can increase the numbers of people who attend our peer support group that would be fantastic, we just really want to show that Gladstone is just as accepting as the larger urban areas."

PCYC youth worker Anna Witty wants the event to promote the fact everybody looks different, "but we're all the same underneath".

"Gladstone is a working, male-dominated town, but we are moving with the times and have up-todate views and opinions."

The PCYC has a support group called Diverse where people who identify as LGBT can hang out and feel safe and comfortable.

Diverse meets on fortnightly Thursdays in the meeting room.

The Gladstone region also has a support group on Facebook, which has a following of more than 400 people.

The grant will help make the family fun day a free event held at the PCYC with activities for little kids as well as young adults

Showing True Colours at Pride Fair 2013



Brunswick Street was closed off for the Pride Rally for the very first time, a large crowd gathered in front of a massive rainbow flag hanging off the side of the Empire Hotel for a rally and a 1.7-kilometre march down to a fair at New Farm Park.

Pride Festival president Deeje Hancock estimated the rally started with about 800 people marching down Brunswick Street towards New Farm Park.

"The march picked up along the way," he said.

"What started as a march about a block long, by the time we got to the Fair Day at New Farm Park, on the corner of Brunswick and Sydney streets, it was 2½ blocks.

"People were just coming in from the sidewalk and joining in."

Mr Hancock said the event's theme – "show your true colours" – was about celebration, not activism.

"Politics hasn't come into it and we try to keep this day as apolitical as possible," he said.

"This is a day of celebration. At the moment, yes, we do have to fight for equality of love and gay marriage and these are important things, but today is really about celebrating what has been achieved.

"In 1988, our bicentennial year, I would not be here talking to you – I would be illegal in this state.

"So it's an amazing couple of decades we've been through and we've got real cause to celebrate, whilst not letting go of the fight to equality."

Many in the LGBTI community were active in the lead-up to the federal election campaigning for marriage equality.

But Mr Hancock said the election of the Abbott government should not dishearten those who want change.

We need to show them it's simply unfair the relationship I have can't be recognised the same way as my heterosexual brother-in-law's relationship, for example."

That acceptance was perhaps demonstrated by the fact Liberal National Party member Robert Cavallucci – the state MP for Brisbane Central – officially launched the march.

Mr Cavallucci, who has previously stated his support for marriage equality, said he was happy to lend his support to the Pride Festival.

"Primarily the reason I'm down here and celebrating today's Pride Festival is because I am the local member for the area it's taking place," he said.

"... I was really pleased to be invited and to participate in today's event because I've always been a strong supporter of the diverse communities that make up the wonderful fabric of the inner-city."
